In Pursuit of Academic Excellence: Phi Theta Kappa Partners with the Academic Support Center to Celebrate Its Founders Day



November 19th was Founders Day for The Phi Theta Kappa International Honor Society. To mark the occasion, AMC's Phi Theta Kappa Chapter, Beta Beta Tau, partnered with the Academic Support Center to distribute information about the Center and to encourage students to take full advantage of the vast array of services they provide. Additionally, Chapter members and other student volunteers canvassed the campus and passed out apples to college staff, faculty and administration. The apple, a traditional gift from students to teachers, was personalized with a ribbon and a note which read, "Thank you for your continued support!" In addition to the Academic Support Center's information brochure, students were also given apples. Two hundred members of AMC's family joined in the celebration.

According to Phi Theta Kappa's website, "Phi Theta Kappa was founded in 1918 by presidents of two-year colleges in Missouri. The founders were seeking to recognize scholastic achievement by their students, and to establish a common purpose and standard for honors organizations on their different campuses. The founders chose to model their new Society after the prestigious senior honor society, Phi Beta Kappa. The name Phi Theta Kappa was taken from the initial letters of the three Greek words meaning wisdom, aspiration and purity. Eleven years later, Phi Theta Kappa was officially recognized by the American



Association of Junior Colleges on November 19, the date now traditionally observed as the Society's Founders Day."

Phi Theta Kappa has more than 2 million members and 1,200 chapters located in all 50 States, U.S. territories, British Virgin Islands, Canada, Germany, Marshall Islands, Micronesia, United Arab Emirates and Palau. It is the premiere honor society of the two-year college and inducts approximately 100,000 students annually with estimates of 200,000 students participating in Phi Theta Kappa programs each year. Dortch Establishes Scholarship

Students, staff, and faculty members united in October to provide assistance to flood victims of the rains that inundated Metropolitan Atlanta counties during the previous month. Many families experienced severe damage to their homes, while others suffered a total loss. It is these situations that a sense of community, duty and service are vitally important. This is when socially conscious members of the Atlanta Metropolitan College community rose to the occasion.

Spearheaded by The Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society and The Social Sciences Association members, AMC collected over 600 items ranging from work gloves, cleaning supplies, and trash bags to disinfectants. Student volunteers categorized and packed the assorted items in nearly 50 ready-to-go buckets. The items were distributed through The Phi Theta Kappa Fall 2009 Leadership and Honors in Action Conference that was hosted by Georgia Highlands College in Rome, Georgia, October 23 – 25. In addition to the Metropolitan Atlanta counties, the items were also earmarked to assist flood victims in Paulding, Douglas and Cobb counties. Due to the overwhelming response from the AMC community, bulk items and donations made after the drive were donated to The Hosea Feed the Hungry and Homeless Agency, a local 503(c) organization.

AMC's Phi Theta Kappa Chapter, Beta Beta Tau, is a Five Star Chapter – a status awarded for excellence in scholarship, service, leadership and fellowship. Membership requirements include: current enrollment at Atlanta Metropolitan College; exemption or exit from Learning Support classes; completion of at least 12 semester hours at Atlanta Metropolitan College; and a cumulative GPA of at least 3.5.

The Social Sciences Association was formed to foster multi-disciplinary scholarship, leadership, and service activities within the Atlanta Metropolitan College academic and larger community. The Association endeavors to: (1) afford students with a scholarly environment for the healthy exchange of ideas and interdisciplinary inquiry; (2) encourage fellowship, partnerships, and the building of leadership skills and; (3) promote personal and professional growth and development for students pursuing a Program of Study in the Social Sciences Division, as well as other socially conscious students.

Thomas W. Dortch, Jr., Chairman Emeritus of 100 Black Men of America and Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of TWD, Inc., has established the Thomas W. Dortch Scholarship Fund at Atlanta Metropolitan College (AMC) with an initial gift of \$5,000.

Dortch and Mrs. Dortch (Carole) established the scholarship to assist deserving students attending AMC. The annual award of \$1,000 will go to a full-time student with a demonstrated financial need, a record of community service and maintains a minimum grade point average of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale. A freshman student is eligible to receive this scholarship for two (2) consecutive years.

Known for his leadership and community service, Mr. Dortch's other accomplishments include: establishing the Black College Alumni Hall of Fame Foundation, Inc. as a vehicle to continuously highlight the major contributions of Historically Black Colleges and Universities and their graduates; cofounding the Georgia Association of Minority Entrepreneurs (GAME) to fill a void as an advocacy organization for minority business development; and co-founding the Greater Atlanta Economic Alliance as a capacity building and business development for the construction and transportation industry.

Mr. Dortch and Mrs. Dortch (Carole) also serve as members of the Atlanta Metropolitan College Foundation Board of Directors.



GA KAGRO Awards Scholarships to AMC Students



The Georgia Korean Grocers Association, Inc. (GA KAGRO) recognized and awarded \$1,000 scholarships to three outstanding AMC students. The winning triad represented AMC very well. Walter Bennett aspires to become a child psychologist. He plans to attend Georgia State University and complete his doctoral studies at Emory

He is also a member of Phi Theta Kappa and volunteers with the Nigerian Youth Alliance. Ansley Williams is a Math, Engineering, and Science Achievement (MESA) Scholar. His career plans include becoming a forensic scientist and working for the Federal Bureau of Investigations. He will be completing his Bachelor's degree at Albany State University. He volunteers with Big Brothers Big Sisters of Atlanta and is Vice President of Leadership for Phi Theta Kappa.

Other recipients included students from Savannah College of Art and Design, Georgia Perimeter College, Emory University, The University of Georgia and Columbia University. A highlight of the evening was congratulatory remarks by Mr. Young W. Han of Connecticut, who is President of the National Korean Grocers Association. Ms. Helen Choi, Chairperson of the Scholarship Committee encouraged the recipients to continue their quest for academic success and excellence, not rest on their laurels and to keep striving for higher ground. The Social Sciences Association Hosts 2nd African Diaspora

Three hundred and thirty-five students gathered to hear Dr. William Jelani Cobb, guest speaker for the Social Sciences Association's African Diaspora Dialogue program in November. The Dialogue is a forum designed for students and professors to talk about the importance of defining the African Diaspora, as well as the benefits and challenges of operating within its prevailing definitions. Dr. Cobb is an acclaimed author, historian and Chair of the History Department at Spelman College.

This year's theme "Willie Lynch is Dead" was taken from an article by Dr. Cobb, which vigorously challenged the authenticity of the now famous "William Lynch Speech." Dr. Cobb's lecture and the subsequent dialogue encouraged students to reject and to dispel commonly held myths about members of the African Diaspora.

In addition to sharing his scholarly research regarding the "Willie Lynch Speech," Dr. Cobb contextualized his lecture with two questions: How does it feel to be a problem? And why do myths exist? The program also

allotted time for students to pose questions and dialogue with Dr.

Cobb regarding his research, issues facing Black America, and the need to celebrate historical and

current victories within the black community. The numerous questions and comments from students met the Associations' founding mission to, "afford students with a scholarly environment for the healthy exchange of ideas and interdisciplinary inquiry."
