COURSE DESCRIPTION

Religion has been in existence from the earliest references of human history. The entire world has been informed by belief in the sacred, seeking the unknown or the transcendent. This introductory course is designed to provide a modest overview of the origins, growth and social impact of various religions around the world. Emphasis will be given to historical personalities and settings that contributed to the establishment of religious movements. Additional attention will be given to the sociological and ethical dimensions of religious belief, practice and intolerance. The material of this course will increase students' knowledge of religious history.

Course Objectives: At the conclusion of this course, students will be able to:

- I. Engage in critical thinking about religions, humanity, and society.
- II. Articulate ways religion has impacted social activism around the world.
- III. Demonstrate an awareness of the challenges/problems inherent in studying religion(s) comparatively and/or cross-culturally.
- IV. Improve communication skills through thinking, writing, and speaking critically about your own historical, social, and cultural position(s) as it/they relate to religion(s).
- V. Increase in perspective with respect to religious and cultural diversity.

Academic Honesty: Only the epitome of professionalism is expected of each student. Cheating or the abetment of cheating is not tolerated. Per page 91-93 of the 2019-2020 Atlanta Metropolitan State College Catalogue the Penalties for Academic Misconduct states: In cases where a student is found guilty of cheating or examination, the instructor may impose a penalty. Types of penalties may include, but are not limited to, the instructor assigning a "F" for the assignment, the instructor not accepting the work, the student being assigned additional work, or the student receiving a grade reduction for the assignment. The maximum penalty the instructor may impose is a grade of "F" for the course.

Grade Breakdown:

- A. **Discussion Forum -25%** Forums are designed to spark discussion about the readings in our textbook and for the course. Posts must be at least 200 words. Discussion forums are collaborative and so students are required to create a thread in response to the provided prompt for each forum. In addition, each student is required to reply to two (2) classmate's posts. Each peer response should be at least 100 words. Mind your grammar and spelling. Cite materials via MLA format. Plagiarism is not tolerated.
- B. **Interview Assignment -15%** Students will conduct a brief interview with a person who actively practices anyone of the religious faith traditions we cover in the course. (Ideally, the interviewee is a non-relative, but

exceptions may be considered). Your interview will result in a 2-page summation. Examples of interview questions may include:

- How long have you practiced/observed your beliefs?
- If comfortable sharing, what led to your conversion into this religion?
- How would you explain your faith to someone who has no prior knowledge of it?
- What is one element of your religion that you potentially struggle with?
 AND.
- What is something you take away from the interview?
- C. Video Summary Reflections (2) -20% Wherever there are videos, students must submit a 1 and half page, double spaced summary of the videos.
- D. **Power Point Activity Paper -15%** Students will research Christianity, Buddhism, Islam, Judaism, OR Hinduism. Slides should information about central personalities in the founding and growth of the religion, major principles and practices and a brief statement on something they learned while conducting their research. Presentations should not exceed seven (7) slides.
- E. **Final Term Paper (FINAL) -25%** Students will submit their term paper using one of the following options:

Option 1: Students will compare two religions' practices. For example, marriage, giving to the poor, etc. in two different religions (ex. Christianity and Buddhism.)

Option 2: Students will write on the history of social activism within one of the religious movements we cover during the semester (use Chapter 9 to assist).

This paper must be at least 5 pages double spaced. Follow MLA format. Your paper must have an identifiable introduction, thesis statement, supporting details and research, a conclusion that clearly summarizes the paper. Your paper must include at least three sources outside of your textbook and include a work cited page. Spelling and grammar errors will count for 1-point deduction for each occurrence. Read over your work. Failure to follow directions will deduct points for your overall paper grade.
