Welcome to Intro to Creative Writing! In this course, there is an emphasis on composing creative nonfiction, fiction, and poetry. In other words, we will study the main genres of creative writing in fiction, creative nonfiction, and poetry. After we go over the genre characteristics and you have read several examples, you will have the opportunity to write

an example of that genre. So, you will write a piece of creative nonfiction, a piece of fiction, and poems.

Prerequisites: Exit or exemption from Learning Support English, Reading, and English Composition 1101.

Required Textbook: Our required textbook is free and has been uploaded to Brightspace under the 'Resources' module. Therefore, you do not have to pay for a textbook in this class. The textbook we are using is called "Introduction to Creative Writing" by Linda Frances Lein. This textbook is an Open Educational Resource.

<u>General Education Learning Outcome:</u> In this course, students will experiment with poetry, prose, and/or drama in the development of their own writing style, using representative works as a guide.

Email Response Time: I will respond to your emails within 24 hours during the week and the next business day on weekends.

Course Delivery Method: This is an online course and does not meet virtually.

Attendance Policy: Students are required to log into the class regularly and submit assignments on Sundays at 11:59 p.m.

<u>Withdrawal:</u> Withdrawal from a course is solely the responsibility of the student. Instructors will not initiate student withdrawals. A student who wishes to withdraw from a course MUST submit a completed Withdrawal Form (Schedule Reductions Form) to the Registrar's Office before mid-term to receive a grade of "W" for the course.

Enrollment Status: Students are ultimately responsible for ensuring that the course(s) in which they enroll are included in the approved degree plan and program map for their program of study. Students must periodically check their enrollment status in this course during the semester. The student is responsible for determining changes in enrollment status and taking necessary steps (e.g., pursuing reinstatement in this course) following those outlined in the AMSC catalog.

Abandoning a Course: It is normal and common to experience unexpected situations. If you are experiencing challenges, contact me during my student help hours so we can develop a plan for your success. Abandoning a course should be avoided at all costs since it will result in an F grade at the end of the semester.

<u>Time Commitment:</u> I understand that we have competing priorities outside of school, so try your best to set aside time to study your notes and complete assignments. Students can expect to spend 3 - 6 hours per week on this course.

Course Culture:

- Treat everyone in the class with respect.
- Be curious and ask questions.
- Log in regularly to check messages from your instructor and other students.
- Check the course calendar, Brightspace email, and AMSC email regularly.
- Read, study, and complete weekly assignments by Sunday at 11:59 p.m.

Conduct: We will engage in discussion forums in our class. You are expected to refrain from profanity, crudeness, and slurs of any kind. Proper conduct applies to all forms of communication in the course. The penalty for not complying with these guidelines is removal from the course.

<u>Late Policy:</u> Sometimes we fall behind due to unforeseen circumstances. Therefore, I do allow late work. Students have **one week after the due date** to submit their work and will be subject to a **10% decrease in the earned grade**.

<u>Late Discussion Posts</u>: Since discussions promote class engagement, students cannot make up discussion forum assignments. However, note that initial discussion posts are due Fridays at 11:59 p.m., and responses to your classmates' posts are due Sunday at 11:59 p.m.
